Minutes of the Board of Commissioner's Regular Meeting

The Regular Meeting of the Leet Township Board of Commissioners was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by Vice-President Carolyn Verszyla at the Leet Township Municipal Building, 194 Ambridge Ave., Fair Oaks, PA 15003. Roll Call: Commissioners present were Carolyn Verszyla, Rody Nash, Dan Peluso, and John Stephansky. Mr. McDaniel participated by phone.

**EXECUTIVE SESSION**

**MOTION:** Mr. Stephansky made a motion to go into Executive Session at 6:37 p.m. to discuss police personnel matters, seconded by Mr. Nash, with all in favor of the motion.

**MOTION:** Mr. Stephansky made a motion to come out of Executive Session at 6:55 p.m. after discussing police personnel matters, seconded by Mr. Nash, with all in favor of the motion.

The meeting started with the Pledge of Allegiance.

**PUBLIC PARTICIPATION**

Wayne Hyjek, Quaker Valley Rotary Club representative, was seeking approval from the Board of Commissioners to put a new roof on the pavilion at Plum Street Park. They are getting bids for the replacement. They will apply for a grant to replace the roof. The grant is up to \$10,000.00 with a 50% match. The Rotary Club will match the grant if it is awarded. The first bid he received was \$4,850.00. The Board agreed and thanked Mr. Hyjek.

Don Birnie, Civil Service Commission Secretary, gave an update on the status of the recent testing. Candidate Kenneth Battaglia passed all testing and the background check. The Civil Service Commission will act on the hiring of Mr. Battaglia on Tuesday and let the Board of Commissioners know the results on Wednesday. There were three applicants and Mr. Battaglia was the only one that passed all phases of the test.

Resident Nancy Seevers was upset that her neighbor's building was in disrepair and had poison ivy growing up the side of it and into her yard. Ms. Rengers filed citations against the property owner and was waiting for the court date. Ms. Seevers will be notified of the court date so she can testify about the condition of the property.

**APPROVAL OF MEETING MINUTES**

**MOTION:** Mr. McDaniel made a motion to approve the July 11, 2022, Board of Commissioner's Regular Meeting Minutes, seconded by Mr. Peluso, with all in favor of the motion.

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July 25, 2022, Meeting Minutes: Correction: Under Public Participation: add the date July 22 and the spelling of Loudermill is one word.

**MOTION:** Mr. McDaniel made a motion to approve the July 25, 2022, Board of Commissioners Workshop Meeting minutes with corrections, seconded by Mr. Nash, with all in favor of the motion.

**Finance Report  
Approval of Bill List and Current Invoices**

**MOTION:** Mr. Stephansky made a motion to pay the bills and current invoices as presented, seconded by Mr. Peluso. Roll call was taken with all in favor of the motion.

**2022 Budget to Actual Report/Department Reports**

The Department and Budget to Actual Reports were passed around the room for review. The Board will come back to this later in the meeting after the reports have been reviewed.

**2022 Budget to Actual Report**

**MOTION:** Mr. Stephansky made a motion to approve the 2022 Budget to Actual Report, seconded by Mr. Nash, with all in favor of the motion.

The rest of the reports will be approved at the end of the meeting.

**UNFINISHED BUSINESS**

**Public Safety Committee  
Acceptance of Interim Chief Panormios' Resignation**

**MOTION:** Mr. Nash made a motion to accept the resignation of Interim Police Chief Steve Panormios, seconded by Mr. Peluso. Roll call was taken with all in favor of the motion.

Mrs. Verszyla said that Interim Chief Panormios did a great job in the position. He gave the Board a rundown of the things he accomplished while here and he overextended himself because he works another full-time position.

**Appointment of Interim Police Chief**

**MOTION:** Mr. Peluso made a motion to amend the agenda to approve the hiring of an interim police chief, seconded by Mr. Nash.

Mr. Verszyla called for public comment on the motion.

Resident Bill Wanto asked the Board when all of this was discussed. He stated that the Board had been having Executive Sessions and amending agendas but was not being transparent. He asked the Board when this was advertised and when did they hire a chief? Mrs. Verszyla stated that they could only put an interim chief in place because of pending litigation. Mr. Wanto asked when the public was notified of this. Mr. Wanto felt there was too much secrecy, and there was zero transparency. The agendas have been questionable at best. Mrs. Verszyla said that legally, the board can amend the agenda and they did not speak with Brian Jameson on Friday at 5 p.m. and did not know if they would have someone to put in place. She could not revise the posted agenda because it was too late on the day before a weekend. The Public Safety Committee (Mrs. Verszyla and Mr. Nash) met with Mr. Jameson on Friday, August 5, 2022. Mr. Jameson met with the Board tonight before the meeting. Mr. Jameson sent his resume to the Board on Friday. Mrs. Verszyla stated that she plays by the rules. Mr. Chesney stated that the Board may amend the agenda according to 712.1 (e). He read the section aloud:

**Changes to agenda.**

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(1) Upon a majority vote of the individuals present and voting during the conduct of a meeting, an agency may add a matter of agency business to the agenda. The reasons for the changes to the agenda shall be announced at the meeting before any vote is conducted to make the changes to the agenda. The agency may subsequently take official action on the matter added to the agenda. The agency shall post the amended agenda on the agency's publicly accessible Internet website, if available, and at the agency's principal office location no later than the first business day following the meeting at which the agenda was changed.

(2) This subsection shall not apply to a conference or a working session under section 707 (relating to exceptions to open meetings) or an executive session under section 708 (relating to executive sessions).

Resident Michael Teegarden stated that the Board had enough notice that Interim Chief Panormios was resigning to put that on the agenda, so the Board should have put the interim chief position on the agenda for discussion. Mr. Teegarden said it should have been put on the agenda regardless of whether or not there was a candidate to hire. He stated that Mr. Chesney read the letter of the law, but the law does not intend for every agenda to be amended. It is stated so on the website, that every agenda is not to be amended. Mrs. Verszyla reiterated that she did not know until 5 p.m. on Friday that there was a candidate, and it was too late to amend the agenda. The agenda must be posted within 24 hours of the meeting. Mr. Chesney stated that the agenda has to be updated on the next business day, but the manager was not in on Saturday. Mr. Teegarden stated that he finds it shortsighted. He feels it should have been put on as potentially on the agenda.

Resident Stacy Ford felt that the Board knew that Steve Panormios was resigning and should have put the appointment of another interim chief on the agenda. Mrs. Verszyla stated that there may have not been a candidate to vote on and many issues have been handed to the Board.

Roll call vote with all in favor of the motion.

**Appointment of Brian Jameson, Interim Police Chief**

Mrs. Verszyla called for a motion to hire Brian Jameson as a full-time working and administrative interim police chief at \$30.00 per hour starting August 9, 2022.

**MOTION:** Mr. Nash made a motion to appoint Brian Jameson to the position of full-time working and administrative Interim Police Chief at an hourly rate of \$30.00 per hour starting on August 9, 2022, seconded by Mr. Peluso.

Resident Salina Everette asked when he was interviewed. Mrs. Verszyla said the Public Safety Committee met with Mr. Jameson today. David Kovacs, LSSE Engineer was sitting at the table with the Commissioners to discuss water issues.

A roll call vote was taken with all in favor of the motion.

**Ratification of action taken at 7/25 Workshop Meeting to terminate Police Chief**

**MOTION:** Mr. McDaniel made a motion to reaffirm his motion made at the July 25, 2022, Board of Commissioners Workshop Meeting to terminate Chief Michael Molinaro, seconded by Mr. Peluso. Roll call was taken with all in favor of the motion.

Resident Salina Everette asked about the results of the police investigation.

Resident Michael Teegarden asked the Board for the official reasons for the termination of Chief Molinaro. Mr. Chesney stated that due to pending litigation they could not discuss specifics, but it was due to the findings of the

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internal investigation. Mr. Teegarden read a newspaper article that said the Chief was fired for improperly correcting a police officer. He asked the Board if the Chief was allowed to correct, hire, and fire officers. He asked if this had been a precedence in the Township. Mr. Chesney stated that there was no precedence and Chief Molinaro was not allowed to hire and fire, and it was a crime for him or anyone else to violate the First-Class Township Code. It states that violation of the code is a misdemeanor punishable by a \$500.00 fine and 90 days in prison. It also said for departments with three or more officers must hire and fire through Civil Service. Mr. Teegarden felt the Board terminated a chief that had done a tremendous amount of work in the community and outreach to bring the community together. The Township is seen as divided and two warring communities, one up the hill and one down the hill. He felt it was unfortunate that the Board spent a lot of time and money to find something somewhere on the Chief. Mr. Nash said this was not a smear campaign. Mr. Teegarden said if the Chief was found to have violated the First-Class Township Code, it was cut and dry it should have been a quick open, closed, and done. Mrs. Verszyla stated that the investigation uncovered other issues and went on longer than anticipated. One day everyone will know what the investigation revealed.

Resident Stacy Ford was curious to know how we could hire through Civil Service when the Civil Service Board was just formed and became active. Mr. Chesney stated that there was a board in place, but through attrition, Civil Service Board members left, and some held offices that were incompatible with the office. He reiterated that departments with three officers or more are by law to be hired through Civil Service. This applies to part-time officers as well. All of the bylaws were rewritten because the old ones were not compliant with the law. This started last year. Ms. Ford asked when the last time there were active Civil Service Board Members. Mr. Chesney stated probably in October. Mrs. Verszyla said the new Board was formed in March.

Resident Sarah Miller welcomed Mr. Jameson and asked the Board how much they have spent on this investigation. The numbers will be available soon.

Resident Sonya Charlesworth asked if the Board had considered merging with another department for cost-effectiveness and the safety of the community. Mrs. Verszyla said that is not a consideration at all. Down the road, it will be cost-effective, but it is a topic for another day. The Interim Chief will be in place until the hearings are over for Mr. Molinaro and the Civil Service Board makes a decision. Mrs. Charlesworth asked if this was pending the litigation with Chief Molinaro. She asked if we were just plugging holes with hiring and has a concern for safety. She felt that funding would be increased if we merged with another department. She felt that lately, the police presence on Ambridge Ave was great. Mrs. Verszyla stated that the interim chief will meet with the officers and assess the needs and there is an established hiring eligibility list starting with the Civil Service Board. There was no eligibility list before because it was never done. Mrs. Verszyla wants the department to be the envy of Quaker Valley. Mrs. Charlesworth would like accountability and oversight. Mr. Chesney said there is no timeline for the litigation. The Board may be able to advertise the position at some point. She asked if the case was Federal or Civil. Mr. Chesney stated there is a civil case that Mr. Molinaro filed, and the Township answered it. In the answer, there is a lot of information. It will be up to the DA, Attorney General, and the US Attorney to decide about the case if it will move forward to another level. Ms. Charlesworth asked about the obligation of the township to protect itself and what are the cost. The findings of the investigation may be sent to those agencies. The investigation is not public, but the costs are public and subject to Right to Know.

Resident Emily Bennet asked if the police officers are required to be civil service tested. Mr. Chesney stated there is a part-time officer who has worked here almost a year and they should be civil service tested. There was a recent test given and the part-time officer would have to take the test to be on the list. A part-time officer would be promoted to full-time if there was an opening.

Don Birnie stated there was a civil service board in place that was working on the bylaws as recently as November.

Mr. Chesney read First Class Township Code 648:

Section 648. Penalty.--A township commissioner who, by vote, appoints an individual to the police force or as a firefighter contrary to the provisions of this subdivision, or a township commissioner or member of the commission who willfully refuses to comply with or conform to the provisions of this subdivision, commits a misdemeanor and,

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upon conviction, shall be sentenced to pay a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500) or to imprisonment not exceeding ninety days, or both.

Mr. Jameson introduced himself to the residents and told them about his experience at Ambridge, Crescent, Bell Acres, and Leetsdale. He is an advocate for the public and children. He is here to do the best job he can, and his door is open, and he will answer any questions. He believes in transparency.

Resident Daniella Helkowski understood that the code was being rewritten and asked if Chief Molinaro was aware of it. Mr. Chesney explained the bylaws have been worked on since 2020, but First-Class Township Code was revised in 2020. This code has been in effect for a while. Ms. Helkowski asked if the Board met with Chief Molinaro to discuss this and make him aware of it. She appreciated that there are members in place and the bylaws are being worked on. She said that the Board should understand how this looks to the community. She understands being falsely accused of things Mr. Nash explained that in the past couple of years the bylaws were out of date and there was an effort to work on that over the past couple of years. Chief Molinaro was aware of the bylaws being out of date because he tried to hire some officers at the time, and he knew the bylaws were not in place. He knew the problems and that a new Board was being formed and put bylaws in place. Ms. Helkowski asked if the code was completely written at the time and if it was implemented. Were all the officers aware of it? The appearance to the community is that there was an allegation against the patrolman that made Molinaro act upon it, and he should not have fired the patrolman. Was the patrolman investigated and what was found? Neither officer should have been working until investigated but it was not handled that way. Mrs. Verszyla explained that the Board has been together for 7 months. Prior to sitting here as a group, there were things that were not being done by previous Boards, and this came to us that we did not have a choice but to act. The things that occurred happened before this Board was together. Ms. Helkowski asked if the patrolman was investigated and what was the finding. If you suspend one, you should suspend the other until the investigation is complete. Mrs. Verszyla said until you get a full picture of the litigation pending and the investigation that occurred you will better understand. Mr. Nash explained the other officer was investigated. Mrs. Helkowski stated that this was never explained to the public. This was not explained to the community, and it makes it look personal. Mrs. Verszyla said the community needs to trust what the Board is doing. She said that you all have children and you have tarnished the man's reputation and he will never be able to work in this profession again. If you wanted to cut ties, I respect that, you do it with dignity. You have ruined his career and maybe he holds part of that himself. It did not have to be done this way. Mr. Nash asked her to reserve judgment until the investigation is revealed. It is frustrating that they have not been able to share with the community.

Mr. Chesney said there seems to be confusion, somehow this played with civil service rules. This is not true. That was happening alongside of what was happening. Ms. Everette asked why Mike was fired if this investigation was still going on. She asked if Mr. Chesney is related to the patrolman. He said no. Ms. Everette said the officer was fired for good reason. Mr. Chesney stated that he should have had a Loudermill hearing to address the issues. He could not talk about any other officer because that is a personnel issue. This process was started, and Mr. Molinaro filed a lawsuit against us.

Resident Kris Shelton asked if there have been any impact studies on the new townhouse development in Bell Acres and the 25mph speed limit on Ambridge Ave. Mrs. Verszyla said they are looking at one thing at a time. Mr. Nash said the Board is aware of the development and the impact it will have on the community and stormwater.

Resident Sarah Miller asked about the results of the investigation into the patrolman. Mrs. Verszyla stated the investigation was about what happened here and not the patrolman himself. Ms. Miller stated that it is the Chief versus the patrolman and the patrolman should speak and say what his plans are for working in the community. Mrs. Verszyla stated that if there are any complaints about the patrolman, they will be followed up on and investigated. She has only heard rumors. Mr. Nash said Interim Chief Jameson will take complaints and follow up.

Resident Emily Bennet said that the Chief was fired after the investigation and is getting a bad reputation but the investigation for the patrolman has not been revealed and nobody knows the results. She does not want personal details but stated that it seems like everything investigated with the patrolman is over and he is fine. Mr. Chesney said that if any officer were found to be wrong and there was evidence to show, the Board would take action with

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the officer. Ms. Bennet said nothing is being said about the patrolman. Mr. Chesney said if the officer were found to do something wrong the Board would hold a Loudermill Hearing. Mrs. Verszyla will let the community know everything she can. Mr. Chesney stated if there was wrongdoing by an officer, the Board would have a Loudermill hearing with the officer. A Statement of Charges would be filed with the Civil Service Board and the officer would be able to appeal. Mrs. Verszyla stated that the Chief was on paid leave until the investigation was over.

Resident Stacy Ford asked if this was about hiring and firing and the Chiefs role of not coming to the Commissioners. How does the Chief hire and fire if there was no Civil Service Board in place? Mrs. Verszyla stated he should come to the Board of Commissioners for hiring and firing. Ms. Ford asked if Mr. Wanto hire and fire through the Civil Service Board. Mr. Chesney said if he did not, he did so unlawfully.

Roll call was taken on the motion to ratify the termination of Chief Molinaro with all in favor of it.

Mrs. Verszyla read the following statement:

The Commissioners have voted to ratify the action taken at the duly advertised July 25, 2022, Board of Commissioners Workshop Meeting to terminate Police Chief Michael Molinaro as a result of the findings of the internal investigation to give the public a chance to comment on this matter. Because there is pending litigation and a personnel matter there is no further comment from the Board of Commissioners at this time.

#### **Property Committee**

##### **Oak Street Tree Review**

A resident complained about two dead trees he believed to be in the Township right of way. The engineer looked at the area and responded that he was not sure if they were in the right of way or not. The manager asked the engineer to quote a price for doing a field survey. Ms. Rengers has not heard from him. Mr. Nash spoke with the engineer, and he did e-mail a quote to Ms. Rengers.

##### **Replacement of Air Conditioning Units at 194 Ambridge Ave**

Ms. Rengers received a bid from Homer Nine and was waiting for a bid from Alberts and Veterans. Mr. Peluso explained that one system is dead and the other froze because one unit cannot handle cooling the space.

##### **Island at Olde Sewickley Highlands Update**

Mr. Peluso contacted Bob Cruzan for a plan for landscaping at the Olde Sewickley Highlands Island. He will try to have a sketch for the Board by the Workshop Meeting.

##### **5-year Building Maintenance Plans**

Mr. Stephansky reported that there have been no maintenance plans for the fixed assets of the Township and for the buildings at 198 or 194 Ambridge Ave. in the past two years. At his request, Ms. Rengers and Mr. Wanto formulated a 5- year maintenance plan for both buildings, and he and Mr. Peluso reviewed these in depth with them. The cost for 198 Ambridge is a total of \$68,000.00, and for 194 Ambridge the cost is \$95,000.00 for a total of \$163,500.00 over five years. This would require a maintenance budget in Capital Reserve of \$32,000.00 annually. We need to tweak some of the maintenance costs as we get estimates and adjust for inflation. For public works, there is a 4-year plan in Capital Reserve of \$35,000.00 annually for equipment purchases. Instead of being reactive, we will be proactive with the maintenance plans, asset management, and budgeting, and this includes the playgrounds, Plum Street Park, and gazebos. Ms. Rengers and Mr. Wanto did an excellent job on this plan.

##### **IT Update**

The IT system was not suited for a municipality and would not pass a public safety audit. Bob Patterson has assured us that public safety will be separated from the administration and antivirus and encryption will be put in place. The system will be updated by the end of the week.

#### **Public Works Committee**

##### **Close out of Neely Street ADA Sidewalk Project**

##### **Approval of Final Estimate No. 1 for \$61,913.90 Payable to Independent Enterprises**

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Independent Enterprises sealed the asphalt and fixed the issues with the pavement. A resident complained that her sidewalk was damaged by Independent Enterprises. Mr. Slagle is speaking with them to fix the sidewalk. He asked that we approve the estimate because the payment will take a couple of months to process. Two different companies did the project because the grant was bid out separately. We will table approval of the payment until the Workshop Meeting to make sure the work is completed.

**Beech/Plum Street Flooding Issues**

LSSE Engineer David Kovacs reported that they had met with Andy to review the Authority's actions. They had a backflow preventer program and conducted a smoke and dye test to identify roof leaders that were tied into the system. They will share the smoke and dye test results with us. The sewer authority will jet the lines and camera the system. The Authority will take care of repairs to the lines. There were 10 or 12 residents with backups, and they will provide them with backflow preventers. They will need to have these installed by a plumber. Ms. Rengers sent out thirty-nine letters to the residents about disconnecting their roof leader lines. Resident Chris Shelton said that some residents do not know where the laterals are coming from and if there will be a meeting with the results of all of the findings when they are available. She has lived there for 25 years and had no problems until the flood of 2004. The backflow check valve is a band-aid. Ms. Shelton is getting sewage backups and the manhole at Markaloy smells terrible.

The laterals are a question for the authority. The homeowner owns from the y back. Bankson Engineering had Insight Pipe clean and identify any issues with the lines and then repair them. Stormwater is not allowed to flow onto a neighbor's property.

Resident Emily Bennet is at the lowest point on the system and has been flooded four times in two years. She filed a claim from the flooding on July 25<sup>th</sup> and paid her deductible. She would like to know the plan for the system and for the sewers to be separated from the storm drains. She had a restoration company come out and tear out the damaged drywall then she flooded again today. She pays her taxes and is not o.k. with this. She feels that this will be a bigger issue down the line.

Sarah Miller lives across the alley from Emily and the last time it flooded all she could smell was sewage. This has been going on for a couple of years. Mrs. Verszyla asked if this was addressed by the previous board. This was discussed with the sewer authority a few years ago. They talked about the backflow preventer. Resident David Gifford has water coming from Stone Alley into his basement. He spoke to someone 10 years ago about it, but nothing was done.

**Approval to Contract Brian's Property Maintenance to Cut Detention Ponds at Watson, Encompass, and Kenney Drive**

Mr. Stephansky spoke with Mr. Wanto about the need for Brian's Maintenance to cut the ponds. Mr. Chesney will work on the contracts for the Workshop Meeting.

**MOTION:** Mr. Stephansky made a motion to have Mr. Chesney draft the contract for Brian's Property Maintenance for street sweeping and cutting the detention ponds, seconded by Mr. Nash, with all in favor of the motion.

**Solicitor**

**Approval to Advertise Act 172, Fire Fighters Tax Ordinance**

Act 172 applies to the residents of Leet. The Fire Chief would set the rules for eligibility and the Board would approve them by resolution.

**MOTION:** Mr. Stephansky made a motion to approve to advertise Act 172, Fire Fighters Tax Ordinance establishing a volunteer service credit program: enacting tax credits for volunteer members of volunteer fire companies, and establishing administrative procedures and appeals, seconded by Mr. Nash with all in favor of the motion.

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**Approval to Advertise Amusement Tax Ordinance**

**MOTION:** Mr. Stephansky made a motion to advertise Ordinance 2022-06 amending the Leet Township Code of Ordinances to repeal Chapter 24, part 2, in its entirety for the Amusement Tax, seconded by Mr. Peluso, with all in favor of the motion.

**Approval to Advertise Occupancy Permit Amendment Ordinance**

**MOTION:** Mr. Stephansky made a motion to advertise Ordinance 2022-07 repealing Chapter 27, Part 8, Section 803, paragraph two, for the requirement to obtain an occupancy permit for the sale of a house, seconded by Mr. Peluso, with all in favor of the motion.

**Dedication/Deed Restriction for War Memorial Update**

The location of the property is being decided on and this will be continued.

**NEW BUSINESS**

**Public Works Committee**

**Olde Sewickley Highlands Stormwater Basin Review**

David Kovac explained the Olde Sewickley Highlands Stormwater Basin Review. LSSE has asked for bids on geotechnical work for this project and will have them for the Workshop meeting.

**Quaker Heights Open Space Drainage Review**

There is no drainage system in the triangle area of the park. There is a catch basin at the end of the street. Underdrains would need to be put in place through the area and connected to the existing drain. A resident has a stack of bricks that helps divert the water runoff from the park onto her property.

**Public Safety Committee**

**Acceptance of QVAA Representative Resignation**

**MOTION:** Mr. Peluso made a motion to accept the resignation of Sarah Miller from the Quaker Valley Ambulance Board, seconded by Mr. Nash, with all in favor of the motion.

**Department Reports**

**Acceptance of Department Reports**
